Stabilizing Swampy Conditions to Widen I-95 in Alexandria, VA

Haley & Aldrich is the lead geotechnical engineer for the design of the Route 1 Interchange for the Woodrow Wilson Bridge that crosses the Potomac River between Maryland and Virginia. The 1.3-mi. long project involves one- and two-lane viaducts, flaring transition structure, and more than four miles of mechanically stabilized earth (MSE) walls. Widening of the existing I-95 roadway will extend into water bodies that are underlain by up to 40 feet of soft compressible organic soils. For this reason, implementation of ground improvement methods such as prefabricated vertical drains to accelerate the settlement of soils and deep mix methods to improve the soil strength and compressibility characteristics is required. This presentation will focus on the geotechnical challenges presented by the ground conditions, and the ground improvement methodologies utilized to solve them.

Durango GEO-Conference

The Colorado Geological Survey (CGS) will host another of their popular Geo-Conferences in October 2001. This year's conference, "Geologic Issues in Southwestern Colorado," will be held at the Durango DoubleTree Hotel on October 15-16, with optional field trips on October 17.

The purpose of the conference is to raise awareness of geology-related issues in Southwestern Colorado and provide information transfer between various stakeholders, in order to promote safer communities and reduce economic losses. Experts from a variety of fields will give presentations that highlight local impacts, innovative means of assessment and mitigation, map and report resources, and recent technologies and activities.

There will be four half-day sessions. Geology and land-use issues and geologic hazards and mitigation will be covered on October 15. On October 16, two regional sessions will cover the San Juan Basin and San Juan Mountains. Among the topics of interest are land-use planning, recognition and mitigation of various geologic hazards, post-wildfire hazards, avalanche forecasting, emergency management, water quality and natural sources of degradation, ground water development, gravel pits, mine remediation and prioritization, and coalbed methane development.

The optional field trips will visit several sites of interest in southwestern Colorado to see excellent examples of geologic hazards near Durango and other sites in the San Juan Mountains between Durango and Silverton. These field trips will add significant perspective and understanding to topics discussed at the conference.

Geoscientists, hydrologists, engineers, planners, builders, realtors, developers, attorneys, contractors, home inspectors, landscape architects, building officials, emergency managers, educators, landowners, and local decision-makers may benefit from attending the Durango Geo-Conference.

The CGS has been hosting Geo-Conferences in Colorado on a regular basis since 1994. The conferences have focused on specific geologic issues in many parts of the state. Past conference locations include Golden (1994), Colorado Springs (1996), Montrose (1997), Glenwood Springs (1998), and Arvada (2000). The conferences are popular events within the local professional community, and have been attended by 150 to 300 people per event.

The cost for the two-day conference is \$125, and the cost for the optional field trips is \$40. Seating is limited, and there is a September 28 cutoff date for registration.
